As I look out my window today, the colors of fall are starting to take hold. We have survived another busy summer here at Devil's Lake and I always look forward to the fall and all that it brings. The long lines of summer have eased, and we have started the rhythm of shutting down some campgrounds and buildings as we prepare for the winter. Sometimes we feel like squirrels gathering the acorns and hickory nuts for the winter as we scurry about trying to get everything done before winter sets in. It is easy to get wrapped up in all we do and forget to take some time to stop and enjoy the journey. I've been blessed to be able to call the park my home for 28 seasons. I've truly enjoyed every season meeting the new visitors and connecting with ones I've known for years and getting out in the park.

I have received a few questions recently regarding the trees that are marked along South Shore Road and throughout the park. We are currently working with the Town of Baraboo to remove hazard and low-quality trees in the road right of way. The trees will be part of a timber sale and will be used for firewood and saw logs. This helps the Town of Baraboo get the work done, prevents traffic hazards and delays when they do fall, and provides a small amount of timber sale proceeds to the park. A number of these trees are also ash trees. We have confirmed Emerald Ash Borer in the park so if the remaining ash trees do not have it by now, I would expect the remaining untreated trees to get it. It eventually kills almost all varieties of ash trees and after 2-3 years they

become a big safety hazard. We also have about 300 more ash and hazard trees to take down in the campgrounds and picnic areas this fall and winter. We are down to treating about 70 high value trees in the park currently. We do plan to use some of these trees for fish cribs that will be going in this winter, a few may be cut for lumber we use for projects at the park, and the leftover will go out for firewood permits.


New Board of Directors for the Friends of Devil's Lake State Park


I look forward to seeing where the Friends will go in the future!
