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Listen for a spell near the south entrance to the Park and you'll hear the familiar calls of the cranes in the nearby meadows and wetlands.

Since the ground has little or no snow, I'm hopeful that the ground will come alive quickly with plant and flowers. Violets and trilliums will soon carpet the landscape, so get hiking and find them. Look closely at the trees, you'll see the buds on the trees erupt into mini-me leaves. Fiddlestick ferns will be poking out from beneath the fallen leaves, searching for warmth and sunlight. From the tops of the bluffs, the forest below turns from a drab brown to that special spring green over the course of a couple weeks.

The Park facilities are also undergoing changes. A new extension of the North Shore Chateau will house the boat rental *and* facilities to change into bathing suits! The state budget also included specific provisions for improvements to other common facilities in the Park, so watch for those to happen over the next year. Last fall, work began to re-route part of the Balanced Rock Trail where climbers frequent... that work will continue by participants in the Volunteer Vacation June 18 to 24... see details within if you want to be a participant!

Spring is a time for change in the Park, so stop in for a visit and enjoy the changes while you can!

## Spring is for the Birds

After all the frigid winter weather we have, it's always a refreshing reminder that spring is around the corner when you start to hear and see the birds returning to the area. During the summer, there are around 135 species of birds that live and breed at Devil's Lake and the surrounding

## Change is afoot! Enjoy it!

It feels like this past winter has lasted longer than it did in past years. The cold hit us hard and long in December... whatever January thaw we had lasted only a couple days... the average temp in February was a couple degrees below normal... March was even colder, daytime temps were close to 10 degrees cooler than average! Snow was lacking as well, making it impossible to cross-country ski or to snowshoe. All in all, I am ready for change!

Above us, the birds are returning, foretelling that spring is on the way. The skies above the bluffs are dotted with the turkey vultures again, soaring aloft and enjoying those thermals! The herons are back and are as noisy as ever in the rookery, making their nests and raising their chicks.

area, but during the migration that number swells. Over 250 species of birds fly through this area on their way to and from their winter and summer homes.

Why do birds migrate? The main reason is lack of food. As colder temperatures move in the flowers die back, lakes and ponds freeze, and insects disappear so birds need to move farther south to find enough food to eat. Cold temperatures can be a motivating factor for the birds to start their migration, but many species, including hummingbirds, can tolerate freezing temperatures if they have enough food. Not all birds migrate long distances. There are short-distance migrants, like the black-capped chickadee, that will migrate from the northern part of Wisconsin to the southern part. There are other, medium-distance migrants, who may only travel a few states away. Canada geese are medium-distance migrants who will only migrate to open water. Then there are the long-distance migrants who will go hundreds of miles from where they nest to where they will spend the winter. The ruby-throated hummingbird is a long-distance migrant, traveling as far south as Panama to spend the winter.

The Baraboo Bluffs (of which Devil's Lake is a part) is a critical area for birds—especially migratory species—because it holds some of the largest, un-fragmented deciduous forests in the upper Midwest. When you combine Devil's Lake and other protected areas in this region, migrating birds have around 50,000 acres of continuous, un-fragmented forest to stop, rest, and eat in before continuing their journeys. A large forested area isn't the only feature that makes this place important to migrating birds; they can also find a lot of diverse habitats here. For example, just within Devil's Lake State Park you can find dry, rocky cliffs; cool, moist valleys; prairies and grasslands; and oak and pine forests to name a few. This variety of habitat is like a superstore for the birds, providing them with everything they need in one stop.

You never know what you'll see during the migration, and this year there are two chances for you to bird-watch! In May, the Friends group is sponsoring two bird-watching programs that the Nature Center has scheduled. If you are an early riser, the first bird-watching event is for you: Lawn Chair Bird-Watching: Birds and Bagels (Saturday, May 5 starting at 8:00am). Make sure to bring a comfortable lawn chair and your binoculars (we'll have a few to loan to participants) as we "park" our lawn chairs near the parking lot in Steinke Basin to watch for meadowlarks, sandhill cranes, red-winged blackbirds, eastern bluebirds, and more! The Friends group will be providing coffee and bagels for us to munch on while we indulge ourselves in a spring morning of birding.

For those who prefer to sleep in, we'll also have an evening lawn chair bird-watching event: Lawn Chair Bird-Watching: Birds and Brats (Saturday, May 12 starting at 6:30pm). Again, make sure to bring a lawn chair and binoculars. We'll do some bird-watching while snacking on a brat or two provided by the Friends group. Both bird-watching events will meet at the Steinke Basin parking lot.

(Lunch is not provided, but members can bring their own or purchase one at the Concessions. Note that members always receive a 10% discount on concessions!) After lunch, we will hike up the East Bluff Trail to witness additional clues to Baraboo's geologic past. We plan to go rain or shine.

The cost of the trip will be \$30 payable to Friends of Devil's Lake. Proceeds offset the cost of field trip

transportation as well as support Devil's Lake State Park's greatest needs.

## Volunteer Vacation

We all enjoy Devil's Lake State Park for its natural beauty, unique geology, and many recreational opportunities. It takes a lot of effort, however, to maintain the Park. Park staff accomplish a lot, but there is always more that needs to be done than resources allow. That's where YOU can help by participating in a "Volunteer Vacation" at Devil's Lake in June 2018 (sponsored by the Friends of Devil's Lake).

A volunteer vacation involves about 12 volunteers joining DLSP staff to work together for almost a week on specific projects to improve the park. The volunteers, with FODL group leaders, will camp together during the week at a DLSP group campsite. The week starts out with the volunteers meeting on Sunday night, then workdays Monday through Friday, and the volunteers departing

Saturday morning. All meals are provided at no extra cost for the entire week (from Sunday night through Saturday morning).

Each workday timeline includes breakfast at the group site, packing a lunch, hiking to the work site, working on the project, breaking for lunch, hiking back to the campsite, and making/having dinner at the campsite. Snack breaks and water breaks are taken often during the workday. It's not all work though... with so many recreational opportunities at DLSP, time off will be taken during the week for a day or a couple half-days (depending on the weather and the group's preference) so you can have *fun* as part of your volunteer vacation too!

You will be able to sign up via the FODL website ([friendsofdevilslake.org](http://friendsofdevilslake.org)) on a first come first served basis, with a waitlist if more than 12 people volunteer. Information about you will need to be provided so we can communicate with you prior to the volunteer vacation. The cost is \$50 per person for the week, or \$25 per person for the week if you, or a member of your household, are a member of FODL. Details about the work projects will be provided on the website.

Volunteers will need to provide their own tents, sleeping bags/pads, eating utensils, and drinking cups/bottles. The work will involve the outdoors so volunteers will need to wear suitable work boots and clothing. Raingear is also recommended to contend with any inclement weather. FODL will provide cookware, cook stoves, utensils, and equipment/supplies for cleaning dishes. Gloves, safety glasses, and tools will be provided for the work.

FODL will provide group leaders for the volunteers. Meals will be planned and provided by the FODL group leaders. Volunteers will be expected to assist with meal preparation and cleanup after meals. FODL group leaders are responsible for organizing and communicating with the volunteers.

Participating in a volunteer vacation will certainly help maintain the park. It will also allow you to experience the Park in a way that few others can—with folks that share your deep interest in the Park. Warning: The friendships and experiences you gain in one short week will last a lifetime!

- Email entries to [richard.hesed@wisconsin.gov](mailto:richard.hesed@wisconsin.gov). Each entry photo file must be labeled with the photographer's name, date, a descriptive word of the photo, and the category it is to be entered. Any photo must be entered in only one category.
- All entries should be sent in JPEG or TIFF format, 5 megabytes or smaller, minimum 300 dpi resolution, and at least 1600 pixels wide or tall.
- Photo entries must have been shot by the contest participant.
- Entries must be received no later than 4:00pm on Sunday, November 4, 2018. **No exceptions.**

### SUBJECT MATTER

- Photos must be taken within the boundaries of Devil's Lake State Park.
- Photos will be judged in six categories: 1) Vistas and

Landscapes, 2) Visitor Activities, 3) Plants, 4) Animals, 5) Winter, 6) Youth Photographer (18 years and younger).

### Effigy Mounds Workday

*Saturday, April 21 | Drop in 10:00am–1:00pm*

The effigy mounds at the park need a little TLC. Volunteers will help trim vegetation, cut out woody species, and help to better mark the mounds' outlines. All tools will be provided, but you may want to bring a pair of work gloves and water along too. Stay for the whole time or come help when you can. Meet at the North Shore Visitor Center. After the work portion of the day, stay afterward for an informational lecture on the effigy mounds presented by Professor George Christianson. The lecture will start around 1:00pm and will be happening in the Rock Elm Shelter (the shelter near the North Shore Boat Launch).

Professor Christianson will be talking about Facts and Fictions: Effigy Mound Builders and their Cemeteries in Wisconsin. Effigy mounds (earthen mounds in the recognizable shape of animals) were constructed throughout what is today the southern half of Wisconsin

during a relatively short window of time between approximately AD 700 and AD 1000. Because these enigmatic earthworks are so visible, they have been the focus of speculation as well as amateur and professional archaeological investigation for over 150 years. Unfortunately, early misconceptions of what the mounds are, what is inside the mounds, and who made them have continued to carry forward into the present making it difficult for most people to sort out the facts from the fiction. This talk will address those misconceptions head-on with archaeological evidence and anthropological research in hopes of laying to rest old ideas that are no longer supportable. After the presentation participants are welcome to walk the north shore on a guided tour of the mounds.

Volunteer and help work on the trails at Devil’s Lake. We’ll work on blocking off “non-official” trails on East and West Bluff trails. ## **Superintendent’s Report**

Greetings Friends! I hope this newsletter finds you happy and healthy as we move into spring. We have had somewhat of a cool spring so far, as winter is still hanging on a bit. We had a University of Wisconsin (UW) women’s crew regatta scheduled for April 7 and 8 that got cancelled because of the cool weather. The ice did not leave the lake until Sunday, April 1. We are still scheduled to have a smaller UW men’s regatta on April 28 and 29 that everyone can come out and enjoy. The UW Athletic Department has also announced that the Big Ten Championship Regatta will be held here at Devil’s Lake in 2019. All the coaches and participants who have participated in the different events here in the past five years or so continue to rave about the lake and park. This has parlayed into us hosting this prestigious event in 2019 during the weekend of May 18 and 19, 2019. Expect lots of athletes and spectators for this neat event.

It has been over a month that Devil’s Lake State Park and a few other properties increased some fees as a part of the new demand-based pricing initiative. When Wisconsin State Parks transitioned to a user-based fee system rather than getting any General Purpose Revenue (GPR) from the State of Wisconsin, the department was tasked with finding ways to raise additional funds for state parks.

The idea behind this demand-based pricing was to raise the daily park sticker and camping on summer weekends at a few high-use properties and to disperse some visitors to other properties while raising some additional revenue. The daily park sticker was raised at Devil’s Lake by \$5 and then at Peninsula and Willow River by \$2. Camping fees were raised at electric sites at Devil’s Lake on weekends during the summer by \$7 per night. Camping fees were also raised at 38 other state properties, but fees were also lowered at 36 other properties based upon their lower occupancy data. Early trends point to an increase in annual stickers based upon this initiative. Our camping reservations appear to be holding strong and I expect to have full campgrounds for much of the camping season here as they always have been.

I am happy that the Friends now have an option of a membership that includes a park sticker. This is a great option to both renew your membership and get a park sticker sent to you at the beginning of the year. Memberships and park stickers can be done online or purchased at the Visitor Center on North Shore.
